Class D (non-commercial) Allowable Materials (*partial list*)

Asphaltic Substances and Concrete
(hardened)

Blocks and Bricks (as masonry products)

Engineered Wood Products (untreated
plywood, OSB, particle board)

Lead Based Paint (IF attached to painted
surface)

“Dry Wall” (IF <1% asbestos containing)

Plaster, Wallboard, Gypsum (IF <1% asbestos
containing)

Hardened Construction Materials (paint,
caulking adhesives,... (IF <1% asbestos
containing)



Class D (non-commercial) Prohibited Materials *(partial list)*

Asbestos Containing Materials

Free Liquids, including Liquid Paint

Pressure Treated Wood and Railroad Ties

Electrical Wastes, including batteries,
flourescent tubes, transformers and
capacitors, and mercury containing
switches

Burnt Debris

Waste Tires

E-Waste (computers and computer
equipment)



Class D (non-commercial) Prohibited Materials *(partial list)*

Appliances and “White” Goods (air conditioners, stoves, dishwashers, freezers, microwave oven, etc.)

Automobile Shredder “Fluff”

Carpet and Synthetic Floor Covering

Putrescible Wastes

Lead and Lead Flashing

Pesticides

Industrial Wastes
